



Strictly dancing

DANCE has a new home in Nottingham. The New English Contemporary Ballet has officially opened a new dance school, just a stones throw away from Mapperley Park. And already scores of budding ballerinas from our area have auditioned and joined this prestigious company's new dance school. As well as attracting many youngsters from Mapperley Park, the school has signed up aspiring dancers from all over the country. TV star Craig Revel Horwood, of Strictly Come Dancing fame, has become official patron of the New English Contemporary Ballet (NECB), something of a coup for the company, which is based at The Haywood Studios, Edwards Lane, Sherwood. might play a bit of a villain on Strictly Come Dancing,' says NECB Artistic Director Niall McMahon, 'but he's one of the good guys really. Craig has a fantastic pedigree as a choreographer, director and a dancer and we

The NECB was set up in Nottingham in 2006. As well as being a national touring dance company, it runs the Nottingham Youth Dance, which has performed at the Edinburgh Festival, and has an Associates Programme which trains young dancers from across the region. The new school will run a 3 year full-time vocational course (for students from 16 to 22) that will ultimately lead to a foundation degree in dance.

Says Niall, 'It absolutely delights me to know we can offer students a place where they are able to train in excellence and fulfil their ambition to become the very best they can'.

Mapperley Park resident Mike Blair, who is on the ballet company's Board of Trustees, says, 'There aren't many professional dance companies in the UK, and even fewer dance schools, which offer this level of training. So for Nottingham to have both is fantastic news for the city and something we need to cherish'.



'One of the top ten cinemas in the world'

NOTTINGHAM'S Broadway is not your average cinema. Over the last 18 years it has developed a reputation for screening the best new films (including independent, World and Hollywood titles), retrospective seasons and several film festivals. Unlike other cinemas, Broadway has a cafe bar serving a range of snacks, meals and beverages (you are allowed to take drinks, including alcohol, into the screens) and exhibits digital art projections by local and international artists.

In 2007, Total Film Magazine named Broadway one of the top 10 cinemas in the

world due to its 'chocolate love seats' designed Nottingham's international designer Sir Paul Smith. The cinema's unique style has placed it at the centre of Nottingham's creative scene and several creative industries have office space at Broadway, including the film production company Wellington Films (London to Brighton) and the film director Steven Sheil (Mum & Dad). The centre also offers professional film training and production services alongside theory based film education courses.

With its cafe bar, cinema auditoria and creative workspaces Broadway may give the impression of being a purpose built building but the site is over 150 years old, having originally opened as a Wesleyan Methodist church in 1839. It remained as a church for over 100 years until in 1966 the Nottingham Regional Film Theatre was established, screening films to the public at the weekends, the first regional theatre to do so outside of London. It remained in part-time operation until 1990 when Broadway opened as a one screen cinema.

Over the next few years Broadway continued to progress with the addition of a second cinema screen, a cafe bar and office space. More recently in 2006 a £5.7 million development was completed that added two new cinema screens (including one designed by international designer Paul Smith), a second bar, and a digital arts programme showcasing work by local and international artists. It is now the flagship cinema for the region and a must-see for film enthusiasts everywhere.

My Favourite Dish:

Local Butcher Tony Wright's Best of British

TONY Wright is a man with 'traditional' tastes. He likes his rugby, his Harley Davidson motorbike and a fine piece of British beef on a Sunday. Good job too, as he's one of the best known butchers in the area.

Tony started out as a butcher's apprentice aged just 12. And even if you haven't visited Wright's, on Hucknall Road in Carrington, you've probably spotted the queues coming out of it every Saturday. It's a local shop, for local people, with a genuine history.

'I've been running the business here since the 1980s' says Tony, 'but there's been a butcher in this building for more than 100 years and I'm only the third owner of the shop in all that time. And the reason for the queues? Well we get to know most of the people who come in regularly and it's nice to have a chat. I also like to give a recipe idea or two when I can. But the real reason we do well is quite simple, good quality cuts of good quality meat.'

TONY WRIGHT'S RECIPE

Rib of Beef with Roast Onions (Serves 8)

6lb rib of beef Dust the surface with flour, a pinch of mustard powder and pepper. Place in a roasting tray with 6 cooking onions. For a medium roast, cook at gas mark 5 or 190c for 25 minutes per pound.

Serve with:

Glazed Parsnips

8 small parsnips cut in half. Blanch in boiling water for 3 minutes, glaze with honey and mustard. Bake at gas mark 6 (200c) for 40 minutes, turning once.

Roast Potatoes

4lb Desiree potatoes, peeled, halved and parboiled. Place a generous portion of goose fat in a roasting tin then heat in oven to gas mark 7 (220c). Add potatoes and roast for 45 - 50 minutes, turning once.

Steamed Seasonal Veg Of your choice!

Yorkshire Pudding

Mix 7oz plain flour, 2 large eggs, 150ml of milk, pinch of salt and a teaspoon of horseradish sauce. Make sure the oven is hot (gas mark 7 or 220c), cook for 25 - 30 minutes in 4 tablespoons of beef dripping.

Beef and Red Wine Gravy

loz plain flour, add the juices from the rib of beef, half a pint of beef stock and 150ml of red wine. Mix, heat and serve.

Delicious wine delights

FOR this edition let's leave the credit crunch behind and treat ourselves to lovely food and wine combinations to tingle taste buds and put a smile on our faces.

Back in October 2008 I was fortunate to attend the 'Salone del Gusto' in the Lingotto in Turin, (think the car chase in the film The Italian Job and you're there). It's a five day food and wine festival celebrating food biodiversity, organic and small produce production. An overwhelming experience when you have in excess of 30 organic olive oil producers, over 2500 italian wines to taste and the epicurean delights of dried meats, filled home made pastas, truffles and mushrooms.

A little fizzy number to start - it always lifts the spirits. How about avoiding the acid, fruitless supermarket 'bogoff offer' fizzy wines and try a proper champagne from organic vineyards made by 'Champagne Raymond Boulard'. He's on the web, as is his UK importer, and you can buy from the domaine where, when you make an appointment, Francis Boulard will take you through his 10 different Champagnes. A real treat. For me the pinot noir dominated Champagne 'Cuvee Mailly' is my favourite and it's around £20 (18 euros at the door).

Follow that with a Sauvignon Blanc this time from Burgundy. I'm a bit tired of New Zealand Sauvignon just now. Lovely though it can be, there is just so much overripe gooseberry



and nettles that I can take. For me the New Zealand styles are only just manageable for a glass or two before my palate gets a little tired. Try a Sauvignon de Saint Bris from domsine 'Goisot' (it's in French Living on King Street) - a little cracker

For the reds I'm off to the auction houses. Bargains galore but do your research beforehand. Christies and Sothebys are safe hunting grounds but do try the smaller independent houses in small market towns - they often have small sales worth visiting.

A Pinot Noir? Try a Chilean version for some bright red strawberry fruit or splash out on a ripe Pinot from Central Otago. For authenticity, go Burgundy - decent value is found just North of Beaune in Pernand Vergelesses and Savigny les Beaune.

Asmall plug for sherry. Massively underrated and brilliant value. The UK is rich pickings for delicious dry and sweet styles from Palomino (the dry fino style) and Pedro Ximinez (intensely sweet) grapes. The latter matches perfectly with Bake well Pudding (note not the Tart), the flavoursallowing both partners to express themselves perfectly. The wine is dense, black and viscous. It should look like and have the consistence of treacle. Gauntley's in Exchange Arcade do a lovely selection, remember small portions and small sips makes for great pleasure. Above all, safe, sensible and pleasurable drinking.

10 tips for good decision making

- Always look for a Healthcare Commission Registered facility: you can be sure that reasonable standards of care and safety will be in place; don't be fobbed off – look for the logo.
- Spend time researching your subject but remember; there is plenty of information and advice on the web and some of it is good! If possible, talk to people who have had the treatment.
- If you can, go to more than one clinic or salon and be prepared to ask further questions.
- 4. If you are nervous, take a friend or family member: prepare a list of questions and take notes.

New speed cameras

THE city council is installing speed cameras on London Road and Mansfield Road. The two stretches of the A60 have been identified as accident black spots where traffic routinely travels faster than the 30mph speed limit.

The average speed cameras will monitor traffic travelling in both directions. Cameras will be installed on London Road between the BBC studios and Trent Bridge and on Mansfield Road between the junction with Hucknall Road and the junction with Haydn road.

The average traffic speed on the A60 is currently 35mph. On Mansfield Road there have recently been 5 serious and 26 minor accidents.

Never too late

Last year I won my first race on a freezing cold morning in a Women's Quadruple scull on the river Soar. This was my second race; a month earlier I had entered the 'Trent Head' on another badhair weather day in a single scull but had the misfortune to capsize twice on the start line. It took two beached landings to get back in but I managed and in time to compete. I came last but coming through Trent Bridge with my entourage of launch boats, it felt like I had come first!

Head racing is all about posting the best possible time over a set distance, anything from 3,000 to 6,000m. Crews row up to a point of the river and then like stacking aircraft wait for their turn to charge back down the course. This type of racing takes place all over the



country between September and March. It is a sight to behold and is all part of the preparation and build-up to the regatta season when crews and boats race side by side hoping to qualify for elite events such as Henley.

Nottingham Rowing Club is the middle boat house between Trent Bridge and Nottingham Forest football ground. In May last year the club had an open day to attract new members. I went along and from my first outing in an 'eight', I was hooked. I then attended sculling school at the National Sports Centre and the rest as they say is history. I am now part of the Women's Intermediate squad

with an age range of 25-48 and I am the oldest!

The club attracts a broad spectrum of ages and ability - from recreational rowers to former and hopeful Olympians. It also has a very lively social scene. If you are small, narrow of beam and would like to learn a new skill, you could try your hand at coxing. I have and it is great fun - you can be in charge of a whole crew of men or women steering the boat and putting them through their paces. Suffice to say, coxes need to be vocal, confident and not afraid of barking a few orders.

To find out more visit the website at www.nrcuk.org or come

down on a Saturday or Sunday morning at around 10 am and ask to speak to the Club Captain. No appointment necessary but avoid days when Nottingham Forest are playing at home.

IT seems like yesterday when I was asked to look at the gardens of Mapperley Hall. The gardens had been planted and maintained by a landscape company employed by the building developers. The garden in 2000 was planted like an out-oftown shopping car park - lots of mass planting of evergreen shrubs for easy maintenance, but no character. It did not complement the beautiful period building at its centre.



I suggested the removal of most of the planting and start again. This was quite drastic but the aim was to get the residents to use the garden as their own as it was a communal garden.

Work started in October 2000. The garden is on different levels with a medium size lawn, surrounded by borders on 3 sides on the first level and then down stone steps to another lawned area and further down to a woodland area. In the first two weeks I removed the shrubs which were not required and began to get a feel for the garden, including its soil type and its weeds! Over



a period of time, I restocked two borders with old English Shrub Roses and the other borders with Irises, Delphiniums, Peonies and Geraniums.

The weeds still crept through but eventually I did manage to get on top of them. At the back of the garden, there was a neglected woodland area and once cleared, Bluebells, Snowdrops and Daffodils found their home. I also planted over 40 Rhododendrons which flower from December to June.

In 2007, the garden was open to the public for the Mapperley Park Garden Trail. A new border was created but I was shocked to discover a sheet of concrete underneath the turf. With the help of a sledgehammer and new planting, the border was created. I also built a stairway in the woodland area. The end result was a pleasing garden, viewed and admired by many in June 2007.

Now my work is done and I must say goodbye. When you say goodbye to a garden, you say goodbye to a friend. I have shared the ups and downs of the reconstruction of the garden and I will always cherish the memories.

Local gardens to open

Some gardens in Thorncliffe Road will be open on 21 June this year, to raise money for the Friends of the Forest. We hope to do a small version of last year's Mapperley Park splendid garden day. Watch local press for details.

IN early Spring the days begin to lengthen; birds are singing, buds bursting and nature starts to re-awaken from its long winter sleep. Look out for some of our early wild flowers they will be adding a welcome splash of colour to the countryside, particularly violets, cowslips and primroses.


Frogs will be spawning and each female will lay a thousand or more eggs. The reason why frogs produce so much spawn is to compensate for the huge losses of potential offspring. A rough estimate is that for every two-thousand eggs laid possibly only five of the tadpoles will survive to be an adult frog and breed themselves. If you are a tadpole, froglet or even a frog you are a potential meal for a wide variety of creatures. This almost endless list includes fish, newts, birds, mammals, water beetles, dragonfly larvae the list is endless.

Birds will be starting to build their nests, if some haven't already done so. To give them a helping hand by saving them time I create a DIY store for the birds visiting my garden. I collect the materials that birds need in order to construct their nests, such as hay, moss and small twigs, etc. I put them in a container, or a convenient location in the garden, and wait for the birds to help themselves. You will be amazed at just how quickly the birds take advantage of these free DIY materials.

Birds are also getting more vocal and woods, hedgerows, parks and gardens are full of their songs. By learning to identify birds by their songs alone you become more aware of the variety of birdlife around you. Bird watching by ear enables you to identify common birds and it will certainly impress your family and friends!

Summer migrant birds will also be joining us by mid-spring, so watch out for swifts, swallows, martins, willow warblers and chiffchaffs. There's always one summer migrant I always listen out for, the cuckoo.

Hedgehogs will be about by mid-spring, having awoken from their long winter sleep. You may see them on their nocturnal wanderings in their search for food to build up their body weight ... one reason for having a garden well-stocked with all kinds of creepycrawlies.

Spring is the most exciting time of the year with nature getting into full swing by producing, developing and creating new life. Whether you are wandering through the countryside, local park or just sitting in your garden, you will be surrounded by the wonderful colours, shapes, scents and sounds of nature.

THIS Tuesday morning is typical of most starts to the day - glued to the TV forecasts and, if in doubt, down to the office internet looking for backup to verify their predictions or to counter their views. Today I was picking up Anna, my assistant at 7am to go back to Wakefield for the fourth time to finish what should have been a single overnight trip. As I went to bed last night, they were promising wall to wall sunshine. Now? Widespread wintry showers. Grrr. ..too risky. I only get paid for the job I've priced, not for all the extra journeys made in the cause of finding sunshine and meteorologists getting it wrong.

So what's it all about then? I photograph architecture, brand new, or recently restored, in the cause of award submissions (seen the RIBA Stirling Prize on TV?), or for magazines and books, for architects folios & designers

brochures. Buildings are three-dimensional objects and need to be shown as such. For the best modelling and render, nothing beats good strong sunshine, and that's what I seek everyday. Frustrating in the UK? You bet. Pointless? Sometimes, but nothing beats the feel of the sun on your back when others are stuck in a dreary office, and you're out and about with your camera. Then, finally seeing the results in print is the high point, the basis of which may reap awards and accolade for that project.

Today will now mean a more local job - this time a vision document for a local authority, and meaning lots of rooftop viewpoints, transport interchanges, retail and housing, for a development plan destined to last for the next ten years.

You may have seen my images at work on a reasonably frequent basis - there have been a couple of books about our own city. In 2006 Nottingham Transformed was published, a 176 page book about regeneration and change in the city over the last 15 years. In addition, Campus Views, a picture book published by the University of Nottingham about their six campuses came out in 2007.

Also in 2007, there was a BBC4 series about photography which featured me, called 'A Digital Picture of Britain', in which I was challenged to do my job with a very different camera to that which I usually used - in this case a tiny compact one. I documented buildings such as the great 1930s masterpiece BOOTS D10 factory, and a stunning private house in The Park, complete with caves. It was fun and frustrating at the same time, and proved that working in front of the camera can be as challenging as staying behind it!

After almost twenty years in the field, 2009 sees another direction for me - a desire to stay a little more in tune with my city, and to connect with others keen on photography. LINE +LIGHT is a photography school, with training days in the field (with me), or in the classroom with my good friend Robert Rowe, where those interested in PhotoShop can spend time improving their images via PC. Two days a month I shall take small groups around either the beautiful University of Nottingham campus with its fine architecture and stunning gardens, or around the city itself, on a day based at Nottingham Castle. Either side of that it will be business as usual: chasing the sun and cursing the met office when they're wrong, or skipping for joy when that sky is deep blue!



House, garden and motor services

A quick inspection could save you money

AS winter draws to a close now is the perfect time to have a look at your roof and guttering, checking for signs of damage that may have occurred during the cold weather.

Rectifying small problems now could save larger repair bills in the future.

With many Mapperley Park houses being of a 'certain age' regular checks are even more important.

Leaking roofs, downpipes and guttering can all cause damp problems, and holes can allow squirrels and birds to take up residence in your loft!

Here are a few simple ideas:

- Use binoculars to check the roof (don't try getting up there on a ladder!)
- Open your loft door and see if any daylight is visible

- between the tiles, which may indicate a problem.
- * Look for slipped or missing tiles - pieces of broken tile on the ground will provide clues where to look - and have them replaced as soon as possible.
- * Check chimneys for signs of leaning and make sure any smoke comes out of the top, not at the bottom or through nearby brickwork.
- * Clear leaves and soil from gutters and check for blocked downpipes. Remove any weeds which may be growing from these areas.
- Check behind downpipes for cracks using a mirror.
- * Check that gutter joints are sound - if they leak when it rains they need attention.
