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WE all take for granted the convenience of having our parade of shops in Carrington, where we have quite a range; a selection of independent retailers, a major chain grocery store, an off licence and even fast food outlets (Panchos for fish and chips and Evergreen for Chinese).

But,in these difficult times, many of he businesses there are experiencing a huge downturn in trade. According to the retailers, the single largest factor has been the closure of the post office, which has meant a significant reduction in customer numbers. Other causes cited were the closure of Mountford House School, and the late afternoon parking restrictions on Mansfield Road – with over zealous traffic wardens keen to ticket cars immediately the clock strikes four.

One retailer also felt that Carrington had little support from the local council; pointing out that whilst Sherwood gets hanging baskets, Christmas lights and CCTV, Carrington gets none. Hansons dress shop has recently closed its doors as has the mobile phone shop. Joe's Store is relocating elsewhere at the end of March. It's time to take action, and support our shops, if we don't want others to follow.

Chantelle Cooper, of **Naughty But Nice**, says she has had to reduce the number of staff she employs due to the fall in trade. She now relies on her buffet catering business to support the income from the shop. Why not pop in and try a freshly made sandwich instead of your usual pre packed type?

In **The Beauty Lounge**, Natalie is relying on her regular clients. She says she now gets very few 'walk in' customers and has had to resort to offering special deals to attract new customers. Fancy a makeover?

At Carrington Pharmacy, Deepak and Kiran Bilakhia have had a big decrease in the

number of prescriptions brought in. Many elderly people used to visit the post office and drop in their prescription at the same time. Now that they have to use Sherwood post office, they have their prescriptions filled there instead. The pharmacy offers many free services including repeat prescriptions, weight management schemes, stop smoking scheme and medicines check ups and the Bilakhia's are keen to offer a personal service to local people – something we may not get from the larger pharmacy chains.

Michael Johal, of **M J News and Dolls Houses** also favours the personal touch. In an effort to accommodate his customers, he would welcome requests from anyone who would like him to stock any particular items. Maybe a favourite chocolate bar or magazine, which you struggle to find elsewhere, could be waiting for you just a short walk away. You only have to ask.

Julie has had **The Flower Gallery** for 21 years and says business has never been so slow. She feels she is losing customers to the supermarkets although she cannot understand why we prefer to buy generic bunches from them instead of making our own personal flower selection from a professional florist. She goes every day to the flower market to make up her bouquets – the one you buy pre packaged could already be several days old. A good point to remember – her market fresh flowers may well

last 2–3 times longer than their supermarket equivalents, making them more cost effective.

Sonia Anderson, who owns and runs **Casa Hairdressing**, said she had noticed a significant drop in business since the post office closed down. She said the parade was a lot quieter and she had suffered a 20 per cent fall in walk-in clients

Sonia is always trying new ideas to entice customers in. Last month she held an open night and about 45 people turned up to try a wide variety of taster treatments. As well as being a great success, the evening raised £55 for the Haiti Disaster Appeal. Casa is offering several special offers. Let them have your e mail address and they will keep you informed of the latest.

Each of these businesses provides us with a convenient service and deserves our support. Please try not to forget they are there!

N.B (The car park to the rear of the parade has been recently re surfaced, providing a solution to the Mansfield Road restrictions - and wardens!)

England's national day - St. George's Day - is on April 23rd. Yet, unlike other countries, England does not really celebrate it.

DESPITE the fact that St. George has been the patron saint of England since the 14th century, only one in five people know that St. George's Day falls on April 23rd and more than a quarter of people living in England do not even know who their patron saint is!

By tradition, April 23rd is the day to wear a red rose (the national flower) in your button hole, however, for most people in England, St. George's Day is just another ordinary working day.

In Nottingham things are different. Last year the city celebrated St. George's Day in style with flags flying, a parade and festivities in the Old Market Square which included children's activities, and a debate on 'What does St George's Day mean to you?'. Many pubs took part and St George

made an appearance at the Trip to Jerusalem.

Nottingham's plans for April 23rd this year are soon to be announced and to help us get into a celebratory mood, here are a few key facts about our St. George:

St. George is the patron saint of England and his emblem, a red cross on a white background, is the flag of England, and part of the British flag. The red cross was

adopted by Richard the Lion Heart and brought to England in the 12th century. The king's soldiers wore it on their tunics to avoid confusion in battle.

Fact and fiction

St. George was actually a brave Roman soldier who protested against the Romans' torture of Christians, and died for his beliefs.

The popularity of St. George in England stems from the time of the early Crusades, when it is said that the Normans saw him in a vision and were subsequently victorious.

One of the best known stories about St. George is his fight with a dragon. It is highly unlikely that he ever fought a dragon, and even more unlikely that he ever actually visited England! Despite this, St. George is known throughout the world as the dragon-slaying patron saint of England.

St. George is also the patron saint of scouting. On the Sunday nearest to 23 April, scouts and guides throughout England parade through high streets and attend a special St George's Day service at their local church.









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Our favourite recipe



Deepak and Kiran Bilakhia of Carrington Pharmacy

Both Deepak and Kiran Bilakhia qualified as pharmacists 30 years ago and they have been running the Carrington Pharmacy for over 20 years.. They also ran two other pharmacies in the Aspley area but these were sold in 2008 and they now concentrate solely on providing a service from Carrington.

They have lived in Mapperley Park for 22 years and say they greatly enjoy its greenery and the quietness. Deepak and Kiran have sent a delicious vegetarian recipe.

MASALA MUNG.

A healthy, nutritious, protein packed vegetarian lentil dish.

INGREDIENTS

Green Mung lentils (from Sainsburys) 250g

FOR THE TEMPERING

3 tbsp Olive oil
1 tsp ginger-garlic paste
(2 cloves garlic, rest ginger)
3 or 4 green chillies finely chopped
1 tsp cumin and coriander powder
Ground cinnamon/clove powder
(1" cinnamon stick with 5 cloves)

2 medium onions chopped 3 medium skinned/chopped tomatoes salt to taste

1 tbsp finely chopped green coriander

PROCEDURE

Wash the mung and boil in 10 cups of water (add more later if required) cook until tender and mash lightly.

Heat the oil in the saucepan and saute the onions over medium heat until golden brown.

Add the rest of the ingredients and stir to get a nice sauce. Add the mung and bring to boil.

Serves 2 to 4, depending on appetite and rest of the menu. Serve with rice and either salad or plain yoghurt.

This recipe can be used for all kinds of lentils, however with chickpeas, it is recommended to soak them overnight prior to boiling them.

We are often asked how to get protein in a daily diet for vegetarians; one can use different kinds of lentils to add variety. Black-eyed beans, kidney beans and aduki beans can be used lightly spiced with salad as a main meal. Lentils can also be sprouted and eaten raw with salads.

Interview with Mapperley Park Resident Ewan Lamont

EVERYONE knows that the greater Nottingham area is home to Forest, Notts County and the Trent Bridge Cricket ground but very few people know that Nottingham is also the home of the Nottingham Caesars, one of the oldest and most successful American football teams playing in the United Kingdom. The Caesars field a senior team in the British American Football League First Division, South West Conference and is affectionately known by its players and fans as "The Big C". The Caesars began life as a youth team in 1986 and in 1992, set up a senior kitted team in competition with the cross-town Nottingham Hoods. The Hoods stopped play in 1994, and this boosted the Caesars considerably, who then posted an undefeated 10-0 record in 1995 championships and a trip to the Britbowl (the equivalent of the FA Cup) in 1997. Mapperley Park resident Ewan Lamont joined the team in the 2002 season when they had hit a bad patch and were in the 2nd Division:

"When I moved to Nottingham I looked into joining a local rugby club as I really enjoyed the game and had played it at a fairly senior level. As a youth I'd played with George Chuter the Leicester and England Hooker but I met a Caesars player at a party who said the team were looking to rebuild after a couple of bad seasons. Like most rugby players I had been pretty scathing of this game where the players wore body armour but this opinion changed when I was at University in



Glasgow and watched the Scottish Claymores play at Hampden. Professional American football is one of the most impressive spectator sports you are ever likely to watch. The coaches test each other in a chess like duel using athletes as playing pieces while play is distilled down to concentrated high octane bursts of speed as the players crash into each other with the force of a car accident. After finding out that Nottingham had a team and needed players there was no looking back."

Ewan played as a defensive back and on special teams from the 2002 season to 2005. In 2002 when playing away against Glasgow Ewan got the longest onside kick recovery in the league's history (32 yards). "As a defensive back my responsibility was to mark the wide receivers and to try and intercept the ball if the quarterback tried to pass to them. This was no mean feat. The ball travels so fast and the receivers knew in advance where it was going. You were considered to be doing well if you could bat it away or tackle the receiver. On special teams I was chasing the ball down when we were kicking off and punting. As soon as play started you had to zip in behind the opposition defenders and take out the guy with the ball.

American football is a tough game and a regular player can pick up a serious injury. In the last game of the 2005 season against Bristol Ewan landed badly after a strong block from a lineman when chasing a punt and suffered a severely fractured humerus. "I was out for a whole season and it was a pretty dark time as the part of the company I worked for folded and I needed to look for a new job with one arm...but I guess that is part of life really you have to take the good with the bad." Sometimes things happen for a reason. I had a year with my Sundays back, I was able to go to church in the run up to my wedding, concentrate on local politics and spend time supporting the team by handling the stats, media and website."

Ewan returned in 2007 but after a broken thumb started to take more of a supportive role. The Caesars are going from strength to strength. If you have a Sunday afternoon free in the summer check to see if the Caesars are playing at Harvey Haddon. They moved into the stadium last season and this amateur sport is beginning to look more and more professional.

Heroes Return 2

Thank you so much for all the kind comments I have received, following my article in the last edition, about my visit to Normandy with my father.

As I said then, although it was a sad outcome for us, it was a fantastic trip which we have no regrets taking and I hope my experience will not deter others from travelling on similar pilgrimages. It really is an amazing experience.

We received help funding our trip through the 'Heroes Return 2' programme which is currently being run by the Big Lottery Fund.

Second World War veterans from the UK, Channel Islands and Republic

of Ireland can apply for travel and accommodation costs to visit the places where they saw active service. War widows and widowers of veterans are also eligible and carers and spouses can also receive funding to travel with veterans.

By November 2009, Heroes Return 2 had paid out £4.95 million for 7,588 veterans, spouses and carers to go on commemorative trips.

The programme is still open for

applications until January 2011. Travel must be completed before the end of December 2010. Grants are available from £150 - £5,500 depending on the number of people taking part and the destination.

You can either make arrangements independently or book through a specialised organisation. The tour I booked was with 'Poppy Travel' – the travel company of the Royal British Legion. They have a full programme of events running to the end of the year.

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HOW would you describe Mapperely Park? Prestigious residential area, close to the city centre, large houses, green gardens and trees. My bet is that trees would feature on many people's descriptions because they are an important and visible part of the Mapperley Park environment. Your residents' association believes they are important and assigns a committee member to deal with trees and at each committee meeting there is a fixed agenda item to discuss matters involving trees. As that committee member, I would like to take this opportunity to review some of the key contacts and information sources available with respect

As a conservation area Mapperley Park's trees enjoy protection and any proposed tree work requires consent from Nottingham City Council. The council's web site is an excellent source of information and advice that anyone contemplating work that might involve a tree should refer to. Alternatively, Edmund Hopkins is the Tree Preservation Officer working in Planning Services and he can be contacted by telephone or email. Our street trees, and there are over a thousand in Mapperley ward with

the majority being in Mapperley Park, are the responsibility of The City Council. Anna Murphy is the Tree Officer responsible for Mapperley Park and she is happy to be contacted with specific questions. I would again refer anyone with questions to the council's web site which inludes a useful section Maintaining Trees - FAQs.

Trees on council owned streets are inspected every three years and the question of street tree pruning especially of the mature trees, for example on Tavistock Drive and Mapperley Hall

Drive, is frequently raised by residents. Rarely is the height of a tree reduced because it gives rise to prolific re-growth which can be detrimental to the long term health of the tree. The Council only reduces the height of trees as a last resort. If a tree's condition is found to influence public safety, reduction of the canopy is always the first consideration before complete removal however, not all tree conditions or tree species can be managed in this way. A highway prune is also carried out to provide clear visibility to signposts and allow free vehicular access.

Trees that are dead or are in such a poor condition that they present a danger to the public are removed as a priority by the council. They will leave a one metre high stump remaining in the ground because this is high enough to be seen and is not a trip hazard. Having spoken to Anna Murphy the council do intend to remove these unsightly stumps providing they have the necessary funding and hopefully this work will start around March 2010. However, it is unlikely that we will see wide scale replacement planting because of the constraints on the council's budget. Residents with a vacant tree pit, that may have been covered over with tarmac, or a stump outside their property that they would like to see replaced by another tree are welcome to contact me and I will coordinate this list and work with Anna to see if there is anything that can be done.

Finally as the trees start to shed their leaves in Autumn I would advise residents to contact the council (City Services) and request their removal. This way we can hopefully avoid problems with flooding caused by the massive build up of leaves that we have seen on occasion in recent times.

Nottingham Literary Lunch



LOCAL POLICE NEWS

Changes in local crime

I begin with a belated introduction because despite having been in this role for more than a year, I was only permanently appointed in July and this is my first contribution. I have been a Police Officer since 1988, working in various areas of Nottingham and, having previously served as a Sergeant at Oxclose Lane, I am delighted to be back. As to what you can expect from me, well my personal views mirror those of our Policing Pledge – to support law-abiding citizens and relentlessly pursue criminals to keep you and your neighbourhoods safe.

That means keeping a keen eye on all crime on my patch. In Mapperley Park, one of my concerns is vehicle crime. There has been a 36 per cent reduction in burglary of people's homes from April 2009 to now, compared to the previous year, but thefts of and from vehicles have increased - and that's not acceptable.



We have increased patrols in the area and are working with local residents, student groups and hotels to stress the most important piece of advice to all motorists — always lock your vehicle and leave absolutely nothing on show.

Another effective option worth considering for residents is to rent a garage, and a number are available from Nottingham City Homes. These can be found in Ravensdene Court, Sunridge Court or Winchester Court. They cost between £7 and £8 per week and are available to all members of the public. Call the Bestwood Housing Office on 0115 915 3301 for more information.

A Day in the Life of ...

Jo Martin, Clinical Director of Mapperley Park Clinic



MY day normally begins around 7.30 to 8am when I get up and have a quick swim followed by breakfast, my favourite meal of the day.

Cleaning and preparing my skin takes several minutes as I can use up to 8 products on my face, neck and décolleté area every morning and evening. 



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Wines for Summer

THE smells of summer, freshly mown grass and the smell of old English roses are so reminiscent to me of the gentle warmth of Summer. Finding those smells in the middle of inner city Nottingham may be somewhat of a challenge, but for the fortunate with mature gardens they will be familiar.

More unfamiliar in this climate is the opening of a new wine shop - well Mapperley Park dwellers your moment has come, for by the time you read this, a new venture will be open on the site of the wine shop at the bottom of Mansfield Road. May I urge you to pop in, have a chat with the the proprietor and get some advice on the latest and greatest buzz wines.

What could be more enticing on a glorious summer's day than a glass of Moscato di Asti. Asti Spumanti as it is also known was "the" drink of the 70s and look - it's back with a vengeance. Fortunately, with more modern winemaking, there's less of the tart thin acid that was so characteristic of the Spumanti's of old. Look out for Bera's version - quite simply the

at least

best, and I absolutely promise that the light delicate 4% alcohol and fragrance will have you coming back for more. Michele Chiaorolo's "Nivole" comes a close second in taste and is probably more widely available (Oddbins). Partner them with some summer fruit pudding if you must, but for me they are a great aperitif.

A recent tasting in Burgundy confirmed my opinions on the 08 vintage in Burgundy. It's thin, weedy and acidic. Unloved by all but the hardened Burgundy lovers who will unearth some lovely wines at the top level. If you like your wines with some fat fruit structure then avoid and wait for what will almost certainly be the vintage of the millennium, the 2009s. 2009 comes in a run of great vintages ending in 9.

Clarets look oversold to me at the moment - the vintage 08 is a light-ish one (witness the oversold 1997s) and the 09 vintage is reputed (reading the blogs) to be, even at this early stage, similar to those of 61, 82 and 89. As ever the truth will be in the bottle and not in points, as many American websites might have you believe.

All the vintage talk one hears is really an overview and generalisation. My only advice to you is look at the growers. Good growers, like all good businesses want their wine to succeed and be loved. They will make good wine. A 1997 Chateau Latour brought to me by a very generous friend for a significant event was, despite the rubbish vintage, absolutely delicious.

This all sounds as if I drink classed growth clarets daily - I wish - well actually I don't, because I generally find mass market Bordeaux dull. One has to spend £25+ to get real class and I don't. The value in Bordeaux is the Fronsac (reds), Entre deux Mers (whites) and the smaller Graves chateaux.

In Burgundy the value is in hills - the Hautes Cotes de Nuits and Beaune - look out for those names on the labels and head for the 05, 06 (both colours) and 07 whites. Don't miss out on Majestics steal of a white Premier cru Montagny though - it is the real thing
