Report from MPRA Chairman

I am very pleased to report that in early January city council

contractors planted a tree on Carisbrooke Drive to thank residents and commemorate last year's Jubilee Street Party.

This was paid for by the Residents' Association. And, to replace tree stumps, five trees were planted on Mapperley Hall Drive and two on Lucknow Drive. This was funded by Nottingham City Council through Councillor Emma Dewinton. We hope to contribute towards this cost. Many thanks to Councillor Dewinton for her help. An article by David Podesta, on Page 20, gives more details of these new trees.

Planning is always high profile, and recently we have had two 'incidents' where work has started before

full planning permission has been obtained. These are on Magdala Road and Carisbrooke Drive. We expressed our concerns to the Planning Department, and Councillor Dewinton has been very helpful. Mike Reade is very effective at looking at planning applications (see page 20) and making comments on behalf of the Association. However, it is very difficult to 'catch' all planning applications, and this does not identify where work has started without a planning application. So, if you see significant building work (e.g. digging of foundations) where you believe no planning application has been obtained, then please contact Mike Reade (or me) (see details on page 2) and we will investigate. A local resident highlighted the problem with the Carisbrooke Drive property. If you are considering altering or extending your property, the Conservation Plan asks that it maintains or enhances Mapperley Park, and please obtain

Planning Permission before you start work.

In conclusion, I would like to thank the MPRA committee for their hard and effective work on your behalf. I believe we are more effective as a Residents' Association than we have ever been, and we have gained an excellent reputation with local organisations and agencies.

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Treading the Boards for 50 Years

On 11th December 1963 Nottingham Playhouse was opened at Wellington Circus by Lord Snowdon. The new Playhouse, designed by Peter Moro, was a bold, iconic building replacing the cramped theatre - a former cinema on the corner of Goldsmith Street and Talbot Street (now the pub Spanky Van Dykes) - that had housed the Playhouse theatre company since 1948.

Nottingham Playhouse as we know it had been commissioned in 1958 by Nottingham City Council, paid for by a lump sum received by the city when gas was nationalised. It opened under the artistic direction of John Neville, Peter Ustinov and Frank Dunlop.

The very first performance was a production of Shakespeare's Coriolanus, directed by Sir Tyrone Guthrie and starring, among others, lan McKellen, Leo McKern, Michael Crawford and the charismatic Neville himself.

Over the years the revolutionary Playhouse building has played host to thousands more performers, directors and designers. It has welcomed audiences in their millions who continue to enjoy its varied output of timeless classics.

enthralling family shows and adventurous new commissions. All of the props. costumes and sets are made by artists on site and plays produced here in Nottingham invariably end up transferring to the West End or touring nationally and, on occasion, internationally.

Throughout 2013 Nottingham Playhouse will be presenting a number of special celebratory events and staging some very high profile productions to celebrate this historic year. This includes the European premiere of Khaled Hosseini's best-selling book The Kite Runner, a revival of the hit cricketing play The Ashes, as well as brand new productions of George Orwell's classic 1984 and William Shakespeare's tale of man of the moment, Richard III.

Nottingham Boys' High School celebrates 500 Years

Nottingham High School is celebrating its 500th anniversary for this 2012/2013 academic year.

The Governing Body and Headmaster, Mr Kevin Fear, decided to celebrate this milestone achievement throughout the 12-month period as the Foundation Charter was actually signed by a young King Henry VIII in November 1512, and the 'Free Schoole' opened in the porch of St Mary's Church, Nottingham, on 2nd February 1513.

Dame Agnes Mellers, the wealthy widow of a local bell founder, with the help of Sir Thomas Lovell, Governor of Nottingham Castle, gained permission from a young Henry VIII to establish a new 'free school for the education, teaching and instruction of boys in good manners and literature'. Her donation of land and property, together with similar gifts from some 86 other benefactors, including a baker, a fletcher, a tanner and a shoe-

maker, connected the school with the town trustees. This union created stability and enabled her legacy to prevail.

The school plans to mark the anniversary with a lasting monument that it hopes will echo Dame Agnes' vision 500 years ago. The school community will celebrate with a series of events and activities, including a special dinner at the House of Commons, and the launch of an Anniversary Bursary Appeal.

The School moved from St Mary's to its own building on Stoney Street very soon after it opened (no-one is quite sure when, but maps from the late 1500s show it as having moved), where it remained until 1868 when it opened on the current site. The foundation stone for this site was laid on 18th October 1866 and the school opened on Waverley Mount on 16th April 1868. The Stoney Street school was demolished in the 1960s.

The former pupils of Nottingham High School are known as Old Nottinghamians (ONs). Notable ONs include DH Lawrence (novelist), Jessie Boot (founder of Boots the Chemist), Ken Clark (MP Conservative), Ed Balls (MP Labour), Sir Roger Carr (President of the CBI), Andy Turner (Olympic athlete).

Garden Waste Collections


Nottingham City Council will collect brown bins for garden waste again from Monday April 2.

The collection day for the brown bin will be the same as the scheduled recycling service (grey-lidded brown bin) but will be made by a different vehicle at a different time. Both garden waste and recycling bins should be put out from 7am to 7pm on the day of collection.

Councillor Alex Norris, Nottingham City Council Portfolio Holder for Area Working, Cleansing and Community Safety, said: "Spring is with us now and people will be busy in their gardens, especially with the Easter break on the way. Brown bins will be collected on the same day as residents' other recycling. Suspending the service over the winter saved £180,000 to help the Council deliver other essential services. This is because only 18 per cent of the total annual garden waste has been collected during November to March in previous years and the whole of the fleet has to be utilised to collect this small amount of waste. The service will run until October again this year."

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Tennis Club sets ambitious goals

Magdala Tennis Club has been successful in its application for a £44k grant from Sport England.

The grant has been awarded to help fund a package of measures to make give the club more appealing and accessible to the wider community. This is all part of the promised inclusivity legacy of the 2012 Olympics – using sport to help support community cohesion.

The club will benefit from:

- 1. A refurbished clubhouse
- 2. Floodlights for the top hard court
- 3. New perimeter fencing

The improvements to the clubhouse will attract wider use from the local community. There has already been interest from neighbourhood associations, local councillors and yoga instructors.

At a committee meeting on January 13th, it was agreed that the momentum that this grant is generating ought to be capitalised on. To this end an ambitious 12-18 month goal of complimenting the clubhouse

refurbishment with improved drainage and a new playing surface on the artificial courts has been set.

Club captain, Ioan Reed-Aspley, said: "Magdala Tennis Club has much going for it. It's ideally situated with some fantastic facilities.

"The Club's decision to invest in a full upgrade of all its facilities, and the recent recruitment of a fantastic coaching team is going to mean Magdala will be one of the very best tennis clubs in the City of Nottingham. We are now working hard to raise the necessary funds to achieve our aim."

Magdala is one the oldest clubs in Nottinghamshire. It boasts a friendly atmosphere and opportunities to play for people of all standards. Those wishing to play more competitively can enjoy matches in the Notts LTA men, women and mixed leagues.

Local MP Chris Leslie

There's a great sense of community in Mapperley Park, but in tough times it's important we protect basic local services that can easily disappear unless residents speak up. The environment and heritage of the neighbourhood often depend on council funding for their upkeep. We take for granted things like street lighting and parks, but with pressures on budgets over at least the next five years I'm worried about the challenges facing the community. Some local authorities are turning to voluntary organisations to take over stewardship

of these facilities, but this can only be a short-term solution. Nevertheless, strong local groups who think creatively can get a step ahead and take the opportunity of limited resources.

Take Mapperley Park Tennis Club, who have just received £50,000 from the Sport England 'Inspired Facilities' Scheme. This will go a long way towards the Club's ambitions to boost services to the local community, including necessary improvements and the addition of a mini-tennis court to help them to provide fantastic opportunities for local schools and community groups.

There are many other groups coming together, in churches, children's activities or just for fun. Once upon a

time the 'Big Society' was central to the Prime Minister's agenda. Today the voluntary sector is struggling with the transition from grants to full independence. Mapperley's community spirit will no doubt thrive, but it's best if done in partnership with the public sector. Council and NHS services are much cherished, but they can reach further if assisted by the volunteer community. Take away the support of public investment and it'll be much harder for voluntary bodies to thrive. I'm keen to hear your views on issues affecting the UK and Nottingham.

Prize-winning butcher goes whole hog!

Famed for some of the best pork sausages in Britain, local butcher Johnny Pusztai (or Johnny Beedham as he's better known) is now giving Heston Blumenthal a run for his money!

Johnny has started inventing some amazing sausage combinations. Fancy a Ploughman's Lunch banger - complete with cheese? Why not follow it up with Rhubarb Crumble and Custard sausage. And finally top it off with Chocolate, Cappuccino and Chili - all in one sausage.

"I admit it sounds weird," says Johnny, "But everyone who's tried them says they taste amazing.

"You have to remember fruit and spices were mixed with meat for hundreds of years either as a savoury or a sweet dish. It's how mince pies came about! It's great fun experimenting to see what can work and that's part of what food should be about."

But it's the traditional meat products that are the staple at Johnny's Mansfield Road shop. And it's those that have put him on the map. It's meant TV appearances on ITV and BBC, as well as the prestigious Producer of the Year title from the Observer Food Monthly a little over a year ago.

In turn that's led to him signing up with Chef's on Tour, travelling all over the country demonstrating how to make signature dishes – including sausages of course! "It does take me away from the shop. But I love meeting people and demonstrating how we can all use the best British ingredients to make great food – without waste."

And with the recent horsemeat scandal in mind, Johnny says it's good to see people are coming back to traditional butchers. "We know exactly what is going into everything we make and sell. We know where the animals are from and how they're treated on the farms. That's incredibly important to me." He says if a customer ever asked he'd be happy to take them to the two local farms where he gets his meat.

Johnny sees it as something of a mission to get the 'real food' message over. He has visited inner city schools teaching youngsters how to make burgers with top quality steak mince. "I'm originally a Radford lad and I know some of these kids have tough lives. Their diets are often not that great and many have only ever seen a burger in McDonalds. But you should see their faces when they taste something they've made themselves, it's priceless." He's also running sausage and burger-making evenings for groups of up to 20 people.

His latest venture is to offer hog roasts for up to 250 people. "I can cater for family parties, social and business events. And of course the pork is free-range and tastes wonderful." And Johnny has lots of other plans fizzing away. So it's watch this space at J.T. Beedham's!

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All change for train station

The major signalling works planned for 2013 will have a significant effect on East Midlands Trains services between 20th July and 26th August 2013, with services being unable to call at Nottingham during this time.

The planning team is working hard to deliver a series of alternative timetables and services to minimise the disruption and inconvenience. These will be finalised this Spring.

Current plans include the following proposed changes:

- London services will not be able serve Nottingham. Trains will instead be starting and terminating at East Midlands Parkway, with some trains also calling at Beeston, with connecting replacement bus services.
- Liverpool to Norwich services will be diverted away from Nottingham,

- but will call additionally at East Midlands Parkway.
- Leicester to Nottingham services will run between Leicester and Loughborough only.
- Matlock/Derby to Nottingham services will start and terminate at Beeston.
- Services to Worksop are to be confirmed.
- CrossCountry services from Cardiff/ Birmingham will start/terminate at Derby, with an hourly shuttle train from Derby to Beeston.
- Northern services from Leeds will mostly terminate at Alfreton.

Service information to and from Lincoln and Skegness:

 Train services can run from Nottingham to Skegness and Lincoln from 20th to 28th of July, and from 10th to 23rd August.

- At all other times, from 29th July to 9th August and from 24th to 26th August, rail replacement buses will run to Grantham, where passengers can connect to train services through to Skegness.
- A rail replacement bus service will also operate to Newark Castle where travellers can connect on to rail services to Lincoln, between 29th July to 9th August, and from 24th to 26th August.

The planning team is working on the creation of plans for significant Rail Replacement bus services to link passengers to stations where trains will operate. These buses will in many cases simply run direct to key destinations to minimise disruption. Also planned is enhancements to car parking capacity at key alternative stations to Nottingham. Further details of these plans will again be available from the Spring.

The Forest regeneration

The money awarded for The Forest Recreation Ground last summer, by the Big Lottery and the Heritage Lottery, combined with the match funding by Nottingham City Council, meant that there was around £5 million for use in restoration work.

Much had been done already, with two major paths restored, a new playground and an outdoor gym provided. The rough bumps, which are part of the new playground, have been sown with a good summer mix of wild flowers; nothing very special except that they are not often seen in a city centre. It's worth taking children along there and seeing how many different flowers they can find.

Residents will have seen that the Pavilion and the Lodge are being worked on, shrouded and fenced round. The covers are soon to come off the Lodge, to ease the work of the painters who are about to start. Both buildings, previously in a very

shabby condition, should become great sources of pride.

A big advantage has been the appointment of a dedicated ranger and a gardener, so that the day-to-day running is immensely improved, whereas before, the shared workers meant divided attention and fragmented work. Some of the problems that we have been working on for years will be tackled, so that the Dell (in the Mansfield Road/Cemetery corner), once the repository

for rubbish – wrecked cars, old freezers, heaps of black bags of rubbish, will be turned into a formal garden.



Wine and eggs!

Easter and eggs. They rather go together like a horse and carriage don't they? If only the same were true about the marriage of eggs and wine.

Eggs and wine are quite the most difficult pairing that one ever may encounter, and I have lost count of the number of dismal failures I have had attempting to marry them.

However all is not lost - the soufflé is your saviour. Think of the glorious combination on Easter morning of that cheese soufflé, rising perfectly and a ripe young American Chardonnay. Littorai winery has some delicious examples, and as it's a feast day, worth every penny. For stockists you'll need to use the internet wine merchants as I find that there is no one locally. For the Paschal Lamb main course then it has to be the iconic Chateau Musar. The flagship of the Lebonese wine industry, it has been an icon wine for as many years as I can care

the recall and certainly as long as I been buying it. It ages gracefully, is sensibly priced on release, yet often tasting better with 10 + years in the cellar, (the older vintages are available at eye-watering prices) yet their junior wine "hochar pere et fils", named after the owner and son, produces a similar palate sensation for those on a tighter budget. It's not a shy retiring wine so go carefully! If claret is your thing, then a lovely mature Pauillac is the wine to head for.

Staying with the soufflé theme for pudding and thinking chocolate, then a recent discovery from the Languedoc hits the spot well. It's a port look-a-like, without the vintage port price but served blind I bet you would have a job telling me where it's from. It's from Domaine

de Garence, it's called "Bruixas Vin de Liqueur Solera Hors d'Age" a real mouthful in all senses, yet it's a cracker and a match with chocolate soufflé and the following cheese course. Speaking of which, have you ever considered white wines with cheese? If not then I suggest you pop into Flying Horse Arcade, head directly to the Cheese Shop and ask for Langres. Open a bottle of unoaked Chardonnay, (you need something with some acidity here) or even better a "Blanc de Blancs" champagne and rest assured the evening will fly by in tastetactic hedonism.

Only please to ensure you serve it with welll-buttered toast ... for the full regal effect!

The secret supper club

In 2013 most of us are comfortable with the concept of eating out in restaurants and the British dining scene is well catered for on the high street and beyond, by all manner of eateries; French, Italian, Asian, the list goes on and on.

Although this choice is common place now, these are not ancient institutions, in fact the restaurant as a concept only dates back a couple of hundred years to the French Revolution, when its birth was truly revolutionary; a place where anybody who had the money could pay to eat. Aristos cheek by jowl with traders; housewives next to duchesses.

In 2009 the 'Supper Club' phenomenon hit London. The pioneers were Horton Jupiter, musician and host of the supper club 'The Secret Ingredient' just opening his living room to strangers, and Kirsten Rodgers with her living room diner 'The Underground Restaurant', which has become somewhat of a generic term.

Now a new underground restaurant is starting up every week in London and is gradually rippling out to the rest of Britain. These are not really restaurants, more a table d'hote with a fixed menu and an authentic atmosphere.

There is a huge variety of styles. Some operate weekly, some monthly, some just when they feel like it. The locations vary from a bedsit to a chateau; a boat to a warehouse. Some can feed up to 50 at a time, others are more intimate affairs of 6-10 people. Each one is as individual as its host. The food is usually cooked by a talented amateur or wannabe professional, always cookedfrom-scratch and invariably the fresh ingredients are locally sourced as this is a big part of the ethos of the genre. From New York to London to Cuba,

these secret supper clubs offer an alternative dining experience for those looking for something new, fun and exciting. It's where foodies are happy to share a meal with people they don't necessarily know, in a venue that is totally unique.

TREES

Hello, my name is David Podesta and I am responsible for everything 'tree related' on the MPRA Committee. I have lived in Mapperley Park for over 14 years and like many people was attracted to the area by the housing and the urban environment formed from the mature established gardens and the street trees.

We are fortunate to have such a green environment living so close to the city centre and my interest in trees with some prompting from my family encouraged me to join the committee in 2002.

My remit is to help MPRA members who need advice and/or have questions with respect to trees. I also liaise with the relevant city council departments who are involved in tree matters such as Planning and the Council's Tree Officers so I can keep the committee informed and report at our AGM on relevant tree topics. Any members with question on trees should contact me on 0115 960 3029 and I will do my best to help.

I believe we need to preserve the urban environment we have in Mapperley Park

and the committee, led by David Towers, has been lobbying the council over the last 2-3 years to implement a replacement tree policy for street trees that have either been removed, leaving a vacant tree pit or are removed leaving the 1m high ugly stump. In the current economic climate where council spending is being cut this is obviously not a priority. However, if something is not put in place Mapperley Park will see and experience a decline in the street tree population and with it degradation in the area we live. We have recently had some success in having some replanting on Mapperley Hall Drive but securing a lasting policy with the city council remains an objective.

PLANNING

My name is Mike Reade and I am the MPRA Committee member that advises on planning and building matters. Although I give my contact details at my practice in Sherwood, the views and opinions given here are my own.

At the larger scale end of development, several sites within the Conservation Area that have attracted our attention are:

• The Lindens at 379 Woodborough Road. The scheme is an existing Victorian House in substantial grounds that was used as a children's home until recently. In 2011 the planning department prepared a design brief which encourages the conversion of the main house back into family housing and proposes two new family houses to be erected in the grounds. The proximity of the new houses has given rise to concerns from the residents of Park House Gates. In July last year the council approved a change in use back into a single dwelling. As yet there have been no applications for planning permission for new dwellings in the location, encouraged by the planners.

- 383 to 387 Woodborough Road This is a piece of land adjacent and to the north east of the Lindens. and with several properties on it of varying degree of architectural quality. The planning department has prepared a development brief indicating its desire to have some buildings, particularly the stable block, retained and suggests there's an opportunity for 10 new houses to be built. Unfortunately the planning brief has given us some cause for concern as it proposes a poor urban design layout for 4 out of the 10 new houses. Our views on this are supported by the planning department.
- Kaplowitch House: 470 Mansfield Road This former elderly person's home has had 'for sale' boards erected recently. I say 'boards' plural because it would appear that the agent may be intentionally attempting to split the site to enhance value. Splitting the properties might lead to a development proposal at the East end [Arlington Drive] of the site. We have obtained a commitment from the planners that the site is and will be considered as a single property.
- Vacant plot at 326 Mansfield Road
 This site is opposite the Lid!
 supermarket and was once the Royston
 Hotel, which was demolished in 2006
 The site has a current planning
 application, registered on 21st January
 2013, for two substantial houses. The
 MPRA Committee has a concern about
 the poor quality of the design. For

instance, in the rest of the Conservation Area uPVC windows are generally only accepted for buildings which are already of a lesser standing architecturally; so to design a building for which the intention is to give it uPVC, assumes the building is inferior.

We expect high quality design for all alterations to properties in the Conservation Area; There have been two significant recent cases of prominent yet poor design, one on Magdala Road and the other on Carisbrooke Drive. The Magdala Road project went as far as a top-level planning meeting being called. The Carisbrooke Drive scheme has been refused once and the redesigned version is a current application.

We rarely have change of use applications within the Conservation Area; however, G4S plc. has a current application for the change of use of a single family dwelling on Tavistock Drive into a children's home. To date, the proposal has received neither objection nor support from the MPRA Committee. Our understanding is that the scheme has not yet received permission.

TRAFFIC

How time flies. It is 18 months since I last wrote about traffic issues in Mapperley Park News. At that time the city council had just introduced a new regime for on-street car parking and the Workplace Parking Levy (WPL) was about to start.

Since then, the parking charges have altered following feedback from the public. A map from the city council's website summarises the three parking zones in the city centre. All zones now operate from 8am to 6pm, with no limit on the length of stay, and a flat rate of $\mathfrak L1$ applies between 6pm and 8pm. Zone 1 is the most expensive, costing $\mathfrak L1$ for each 30 minutes. The nearest meters to Mapperley Park are those on Mansfield Road, south of its junction with Huntingdon Street, in Zone 2.

WPL has been running since October 2011. It is a charge on all employers, with more than 10 employees, within the administrative boundary of Nottingham City Council that provide workplace parking. The initial charge was £288 per space

per year. In December 2012 the council announced that for the period 1st April 2013 to 31st March 2014 the charge will increase to £334.

All money raised from the WPL must be used to improve local transport for Nottingham. It will provide funding for NET Phase 2 (the extensions to the existing tram system), the redevelopment of the railway station, and also the Link bus network.

There has been a lot said about the pros and cons of the WPL, but in my mind being able to park at your place of employment for less than £2 a day is not prohibitive, especially compared with the price of meter parking. It is also good to see joined-up thinking at the council, tackling both at the same time, and adjusting their meter charges in response to feedback. The public transport improvements it funds will be welcome, and beneficial to all if it removes some road congestion.

There are some hot-spots in Mapperley Park where car parking is a concern. At the AGM (28.11.12) of Mapperley Road Neighbourhood Watch, Councillor Emma Dewinton was on hand to hear some of the concerns:

- Level of commuter/shopper parking, accidents, and speeding on Mapperley Road, between Cranmer Street and Mansfield Road.
- Possible displacement from the WPL.
- Access for large vehicles such as coaches during school times and the bin lorries.

 Cars are parked for 10 days or more residents suspect that students are parking there because they cannot park on Forest Road.

In January 2013 Councillor Dewinton provided an update to MPRA on the concerns raised. The city council's traffic management and road safety officers have been asked to visit the area to investigate. We wait to hear the outcome.

In the meantime, the city council will enforce traffic regulation orders such as single and double yellow lines. The council also enforce the blocking of driveways, and Civil Enforcement Officers (traffic wardens) have the power to issue a Penalty Charge Notice and have vehicles removed.

The Council is looking to start two pilot schemes in the city, with the aim of reducing parking on the pavement. Experimental orders will be introduced along with the relevant signage.

There are locations other than Mapperley Road within our area that suffer from onstreet parking during the day: Magdala Road and St Andrews Road are mentioned most often. Residents suspect that at least some of those parking do so on the periphery of the city centre to avoid expensive car parking charges. Whatever happens, this is an issue that is being monitored by the residents' association.

News from the Blues. . .

On January 2nd 2013 I took over the position of Beat Manager for the Mapperley Park beat. I work as part of the Mapperley and Wells neighbourhood policing team based at St Anns Police Station.

I have been a constable for just over 12 years and have spent all of my service working in the St Anns area. For nearly 7 years I have been the beat manager for the Marple Square beat of St Anns, which borders the Mapperley Park beat.

The Mapperley Park policing team consists of PCSO Rebecca Sprake, PCSO Nicola Parkin, CPO Paul Pugsley, and me.

Our role is to work with the community to deal with issues that cause concern such as anti social behaviour, house burglary and car crime. We also work with your Neighbourhood Watch schemes and I would encourage as many people as possible to join them. We also use a system called Neighbourhood Alert, which allows us to send information, by email about incidents in your area. This allows you to be aware of what is going on around you but also allows us to appeal for information for incidents that have occurred. If you would like to sign up then let us know, it won't cost you a penny. You can also protect your property by using smart water. If you don't have it then ask us to get you some. Again, it is absolutely free.

Crime can often be a worry for people but it is often the perception of crime that causes most harm. Crime in the Mapperley Park beat area is actually down by 13.1% since this time last year (07/02/2013).

I hope to meet lots of you over the next few months. You may see me walking the beat but if you don't it doesn't mean I'm not out there trying to keep your community safe.



Callers at the Door

- A Resident's Warning!

Most of us have 'callers at the door' trying to sell us dusters, tea towels etc.

For me, this developed into the individual coming in distress asking for money (and not bringing any goods).

Initially, he asked for modest amounts, which increased with time. He wanted money for overnight accommodation. Initially, his mother was ill, then she died. This developed to wanting money for travelling to his aunt in Norfolk.

In a week-end in November he brought a large dog, which got taken into the RSPCA, when he required more money to get it released. The money I gave him was consumed with requests for more. Over a period of 2 days I gave him over £100. I decided that was enough.

Some weeks later, he came at 2am, saying he had been stabbed and wanting me to call an ambulance. I dialled 999, and the operator realised I was in more danger than my 'visitor', so he called the police. When the police arrived with their blue light flashing, he disappeared.

It is probable that most, if not all, of his stories were fictitious, and designed to extract money from me.

The Police told me never to give these people money. This was confirmed by our local Councillors. The Police asked me to telephone 999 if this happens again.

I am writing this for MPN as a warning to residents. Although your religious beliefs (or concern for people in need) may encourage you to give financial help to visitors to your door, NEVER DO IT. If you give them money, it only encourages them to return (you will be a 'honey pot'), with even greater demands and possibly violence.

If you want to give money to the homeless, give it to a Charity, like Framework. NEVER to individuals.


