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

There are not many certainties in life but the excellence of the MPGG'S Programme is one of them. Here are some of the highlights we enjoyed during 2016.

In January the group found paradise in St Jude's church via a talk about the lost gardens of Heligan by Stuart Dixon.

The sun returned to the world in February so we visited Holme Pierrepont Hall to feast our eyes on the lambs & Snowdrops, all basking in the glorious Spring sunshine.

"Rough Winds" returned in March but we avoided them by nipping in & out of the Woodthorpe Park Nurseries to see them at work & to listen to an interesting talk about the changes the Park has had to make in order to survive in these testing times.

Spring arrived – so as we had enjoyed a previous visit to Capability Barn we decided to return to Gonalston to one of our favourite gardens. There was much discussion as to how it might be possible to replicate some of the interesting features seen in this garden in our own gardens in Mapperley. These discussions were greatly aided by Tea & Cake.

By the time we arrived at the Wild Flower Farm in May most of the flowers had set their seed & had retired to rest. After our investigations we too retired but to the café where we enjoyed excellent cake & tea.

June was a bumper month - we had two visits - the first, another return

visit, this time closer to home. We went to see the changes Leslie had made to The Lodge & to enjoy wine & nibbles in her lofty & interesting garden.

Idyllic July weather was reserved for our visit to Park Farm Southwell. This was an eye opener, 3 acres of remarkable gardening. The herbaceous borders of Kew or Wisley are longer but not as breathtaking as those of Park Farm. One can see the squared paper of a trained designer behind them. The borders of Park Farm are not constrained by such devices, they flow, they have soul.

August - The amazing thing about the Garden Group's Programme is its ability to carry on offering amazing gardens for its members to visit. The August garden was another stunner, much smaller than the Southwell one but packed with many attractive features you felt would translate well to your own small plot. The strength of this garden I think is in the placing & contrasting of plants, it gives courage & ideas to hesitant gardeners.



Our year was rounded off by a Plant Swap at Mapperley Hall in September & a Fungi Walk in Blidworth Woods in October. All that remains is to enjoy a talk on Echiums in November & visit Home & Gardens (Flora lands) for coffee, shopping & chat in December

Congratulations to our new Mapperley Park "A list" celebrity gardeners Michael Blood and Malcolm Bescoby.



The weather was against us but it didn't curb the enthusiasm and plenty of fun was had by all who attended. Entertainment included face painting, a drumming workshop, games in the garden, a well stocked bar and wonderful music provided by the Nottingham High School girls' choir and Highly Strung Guitars. The Hospice raised £210 on the day which went towards supporting their patients in day therapy and supporting their family carers to take a break.

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After BBC Young Musician

On 15th May 2016, Sheku Kanneh-Mason from Richmond Drive. Mapperlev Park, won the coveted title of BBC Young Musician 2016.

In the grand Final at The Barbican, Sheku played Shostakovich Cello Concerto No 1 with the BBC Symphony Orchestra, receiving a standing ovation from the packed concert hall. The competition final was shown live on BBC TV with a two hour delay. This meant that family

and friends who had travelled to London to be in the audience (including headteacher and teachers from Trinity School) had to try very hard to keep away from texts and social media to keep the secret until the programme was aired!

Since then, life has become extremely busy and a little crazy for Sheku. With

interviews and articles in The Daily Mail, The New Statesman, The Guardian, The Times, The Observer, front covers on the magazines: The Music Teacher, Classical Music Magazine and ESTA magazine, and forthcoming television appearances including The One Show and the BBC4 documentary about Sheku and his family: Young, Gifted and Classical (November 2016), there is very little down time. Sheku's concert schedule has become very full, nationwide and international.

He appeared on BBC Proms, playing Haydn's Cello Concerto in C, made his debut at The Royal Festival Hall and will return to The Barbican as part of

The Kanneh-Mason piano trio, and as a concerto soloist with The National Youth Orchestra in April. Concerts are lined up through to the end of 2018, including with The City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra, The BBC Symphony, The National Orchestra of Wales and the National Orchestra of France. Sheku travels to the USA, Canada, Germany, Guernsey and Switzerland for concerts in Sheku's concert schedule, he has moved

The most exciting development has been Sheku's signing with Decca Classics (Universal). Sheku has a contract to initially record three albums, along with some shorter recordings. In Autumn 2017, he will begin the process of recording Shostakovich Cello Concerto No 1. Along with the busy schedule of his brothers and sisters (including the piano trio engagements and invitations for the Kanneh-Masons to perform internationally), Sheku is determinedly trying to focus on his A Levels in Maths, Physics and Music at Trinity School.

Guide Dog puppy walking

With the Trimble Family

Some readers will have spotted us walking our Guide Dog puppies around Mapperley Park and Sherwood, and attending events such as the Queen's Birthday Party at Nottinghamshire Hospice.

We have had two puppies: Charlie is now a fully fledged guide dog in Chorley, while Winston is still in training. Bringing up, and training, these dogs has been a wonderful experience, which we would recommend to anyone.

The Guide Dogs for the Blind Association is a charity, founded in 1934. They first recruited puppy walkers in 1956, and a few years later began a breeding programme. It is now a national organisation with four Guide Dog Training Schools, the nearest of which are at Atherton and Leamington. Those of us of a certain age will remember collecting milk bottle tops for Blue Peter

in the mid-1960s to fund two guide dog puppies, Cindy and Honey. They still rely on charitable contributions, and on their many volunteers.

Volunteer puppy walkers play a key role in the early socialisation and education of guide dogs. You receive the puppy aged 6-8 weeks and they stay with you until they're 12-14 months old, when they transfer to a specialised training centre.

They then go through around 26 weeks training, including four weeks of training with their new owner.

Charlie was a yellow labrador, and Winston a lab / retriever cross, the commonest guide dog breeds. They also train labradoodles and german shepherds. All the dogs are carefully bred and selected, and have close vetinary supervision during their first year. The Guide Dogs Association pay all the vets' bills, provide leads, coats, and dog car seat harnesses, in addition to all the food, which is delivered to your door.

The job of the puppy walker is to give the puppy a welcoming home, and to rear them with a blend of affection, control and supervision. Throughout the year you will receive regular visits from your Training Supervisor, and will be expected to attend puppy classes once a fortnight. You must train your puppy to take their food only on command and also go to the toilet on command. They must never be given human food, but can have dog 'tidbits'

as training rewards. In truth, it is the puppy walker and their family that need training, and we have learnt a great deal, which we will use if and when we get another puppy.

Guide dog puppies have to learn to socialise and are therefore taken to places where dogs don't often go, such as public transport, shops, restaurants, and the workplace. We took both dogs away on

> holiday to the coast which they loved.

how we can bear to part with our lovely dog and the truth is

that it is hard. However, you know from Day One that they will be leaving, you realise they are working dogs, and that they are hopefully going on to transform a blind person's life.

Puppy walking is a commitment and there are various requirements to meet, not least the time commitment, as young puppies cannot be left for more than a few hours at a time.

Resolve Disputes Quickly and Cost Effectively Through Mediation

Dispute is a trying time for us, at some point in our lives we will all disagree with others and managing this effectively can prevent escalation and painful situations. To take a dispute to court is incredibly stressful both mentally and financially. Mediation is my alternative dispute resolution speciality. It's a fraction of litigation costs, over in a day or less and I cannot emphasise enough how much stress is avoided. Mediation can be used at any point but sooner is better, it has an extremely high success rate and even on the rare occasions an agreement is not achieved the scene is set so that most cases will settle shortly after. The courts look upon Mediation very favourably and encourage it; they could take this in to consideration when awarding costs.

The mechanism is relatively simple. I will have a statement in advance from each party. On the day, we have meeting rooms booked with refreshments. I make sure everybody is as comfortable as possible. I lay down some ground rules and each party will state their position. The parties move to separate rooms for confidential conversations where I can get a feel for potential routes to resolution; I may ask the parties to share some information to facilitate agreement. This process goes back and forth several times typically lasting between 2–6 hours. The session is confidential and without prejudice so that nothing can be used later should the case go further; this encourages a free flow of ideas and gives people some security. We culminate with a group meeting where legal agreements are drafted. On signing documents the relief in the room is palpable and sometimes people are in tears of relief with the closure.

Next time you have a disagreement with your business partners, client, builder, children's school or anyone else, think it through first and try to resolve it right away.

difficult time in their lives.






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Grilled Rack of Lamb

300g New Zealand lamb rack 50g Mashed potato 1 Baby sweetcorn (blanched) 2 Baby carrots (blanched) 2 pces Broccoli (blanched) 1 Onion Bhaji 1 Zucchini Mixed crust garnish Butter masala sauce Fresh herbs for garnish

Home BBQ Marinade

20g Salt 50g Deghi Mirch (Red chilli powder) 50ml Lemon juice 1 tsp Garlic and ginger paste 2 tsp Sunflower oil 2 tsp Yogurt

Mix the marinade ingredients and stir well.

Onion Bhaji

1 onion (sliced)
1 tsp Cornflour
1 tsp Chick pea flour
1 tsp Garam masala
Salt (to taste)
Water

Mix the onion bhaji ingredients together, leave to stand for 10 minutes and fry on a high heat for about 5 minutes, until half cooked, then drain the oil and press into a mould. Fry again for one minute.

Butter Masala Sauce

1 Small onion (Sliced)
10g Ginger paste
10g Garlic paste
2 pc Fresh tomatoes (Chopped)
4 pcs Cashew nuts
1 tsp Red chilli powder
½ tsp Garam masala
Pinch of Dry Fenugreek
1 tbsp butter
100ml Single cream
10ml Olive oil
Pinch of salt
280g Paneer (Indian cottage cheese)
200ml Tomato puree

Sauté the sliced onions with the ginger paste and garlic paste until a light golden colour. Add the tomatoes and cook for another 2 minutes. Add the rest of the ingredients except for the cream and butter. Cover and cook on a slow heat for another 15 minutes, stirring every few minutes.

Remove the lid and cook for a further 1 minute on a high heat.
Stir in the cream and butter. Take the pan off the heat and blend the sauce into a smooth paste. Season with salt to taste.

Method

Season the rack of lamb and seal on a high heat. Marinate the rack with the home barbeque marinate and mix well. Leave for two hours. Cook on a charcoal grill for 8–10 minutes, turning over every minute, until cooked, pink inside. Cook longer for well done. Place the rack of lamb on the plate and finish with the butter masala sauce over. Garnish with fresh herbs.

Prepare the onion bhaji and set on the plate. Cook the mash potato and set onto the onion bhaji. Slice the zucchini lengthways and with a single raw middle slice, wrap it around the mash potato. Garnish the same with fresh herbs. Sauté the preblanched vegetables and place on the plate. **Enjoy!**

Gillespies in Mapperley Park

After more than a century, at the end of this year when I leave the house I was brought up in, there will be no Gillespies or their relatives in Mapperley Park.

It all began in about 1909 when a newly married chartered accountant, Henry Robert (Bob) Gillespie (my Grandfather), moved into 9 Ebers Grove. The exact date is unknown as to whether it was owned or rented, but the Census confirms that he and his wife (Maude Mary) were the residents in 1911.

Post qualification, it is known that Bob Gillespie was employed by Jesse Boot and he remained with Boots Pure Drug Company for the rest of his life. My father was born and spent his early years in Ebers Grove, but in about 1919 a move was to be made.

Carisbrooke Drive was being developed at that time and my Grandparents bought what appears to have been a 'new build'. They owned number 18, which was one of 3 or more architecturally designed homes at the Tavistock Drive end of the road. In 1936, Bob Gillespie died suddenly aged 55, collapsing while walking on Mapperley Hall Drive one Sunday afternoon.

At the time he was the Financial Director of Boots Pure Drug Co. During his funeral, Boots closed the Station Street offices for the first and only time so that the staff could attend.

The house was finally sold in 1953 after the death of his widow.

My father (John Robert Gillespie) attended Nottingham High School (where he was later Chairman of the Governors), before getting a Law degree at Clare College, Cambridge. After the war (he ended it as a Lieutenant Colonel with the Sherwood Foresters) he returned to his chosen profession as a solicitor.



In 1948 he proposed to my mother, whom he had known since childhood through St Andrews Presbyterian Church in Goldsmith Street, and this brought two Mapperley Park families together.

My mother (Honora Margaret (Peggy) Littlefair) had moved from Harlaxton Drive with her parents and little sister to 14 Warwick Road in approximately 1924. She was the daughter of Joseph Littlefair, a tailor on Bridlesmith Gate.

Joseph Littlefair was also a local politician who led the Conservative group on Nottingham City Council for a number of years, he served as Sheriff but was also Lord Mayor in 1958/9 and hence was in the Royal Box at Wembley as Nottingham Forest had their one and only triumph in an FA Cup final.

After schooling at the Nottingham Girls' High School and St Bride's School, Helensburgh, Peggy Littlefair went to the Nottingham Regional Technical College, from where she was the first woman ever to qualify in Architecture in Nottingham.

Post graduation, she went to work for Cecil Howitt, the nationally renowned architect who designed (amongst many other buildings) the Nottingham Council House. Gordon Littlefair (the younger brother of Joseph) and family lived for many years at 18 Arlington Drive.

As an engaged couple, my parents had the huge advantages of being a solicitor and an architect.

One day in 1948, they heard that not only was the derelict piece of land on the corner of Mapperley Hall Drive and Lucknow Drive for sale, but also there were 2 licences on offer for a new build house (until then the only construction work had been for rebuilding as a result of bomb damage).

Literally within hours (having climbed the walls at lunchtime) they had purchased the land and obtained a licence to build. Contracts in our possession show my mother to be the architect and my father as the client.

55 Mapperley Hall Drive was developed and occupied in 1949. It could only be of a certain size as timber was still in short supply, so when my brother and I turned up in the 1950s, and opportunity arose to buy more land, the house was extended to its present size in 1960.

My father died in 1969, but my mother remained at the house, owning it until her death (aged 96) in 2013. I have spent time sorting out so many years of life there, but the house is now being sold and when I leave, for the first time since Mapperley Park was built, there will be no Gillespies (or Littlefairs) living in there.



Minton Tile Restoration

One of the challenges of living in a conservation zone is keeping the character of the buildings intact whilst keeping up with all the mod cons of modern life.

Pretty much all of us have fallen in love with Victorian or Edwardian buildings but pretty much none of us would dispense with washing machines, central heating and indoor toilets. Each one of us has in our houses several stories to tell of how we have managed to keep this balance of owing a dept to the past while enhancing our house for the future. I'm intrigued to hear them all so thought I'd get the ball rolling with my own little DIY adventure.

When we moved into our new house in Mapperley Park a lot of the rooms had been tastefully decorated by the previous owners and there was generally not much we needed to do. The one change that we knew we had to make was to remove the carpet from the downstairs hallway and to sand back the floorboards. Most of the downstairs rooms were already tiled or

sanded and it would mean we wouldn't have to worry about guests keeping their shoes on. When we lifted up the carpet we discovered to our delight that under the carpet was the original minton tile floor. This turned to horror when we realised that every square inch of tile was covered in adhesive, that

about a quarter were missing, the missing spaces were filled with cement and quite a few were cracked or chipped.

Step one was the clean up. I tried all sorts of methods and chemicals, heavy duty tile cleaner and mopping had no effect as did paint remover and brick acid (really not recommended). Only specialist evo stick adhesive cleaner did anything and that just rendered the adhesive into a chewing gum like paste. The only thing that really worked was a wallpaper steamer, a stripper and about 3 weeks hard labour. I did reuse the adhesive cleaner to mop up any small bits left over by the steaming and scraping and paint remover did work really well on the adhesive used to stick down the wooden carpet grippers.

Step 2 was patching the missing tiles.

Most of the cement in fill was easily
dispatched with a sledgehammer and
masonry chisel. One tough bit near the
stairs needed a bit of matrimonial trust
as one of us held the chisel in place...
Replacement Minton tilers are fortunately
a lot easier than I feared to get hold of.
There are several restoration yards in
Notts and the Original Style range from
EMC tiles on Hucknall Road has totally
accurate reproductions of the originals.
They are about 2 mil thinner though,

I learned this to my cost on a small patch that I now refer to as the "minton cobbles". If copying this don't be fooled into following the outline left by the Victorians/Edwardian tiler, use a lot of self mixed adhesive on single tiles and if there is a large area screed it first with floor leveller.

Step 3 just before grouting I needed to fill in the chips and small hairline cracks. The best thing for this is milliput, coloured epoxy resin that is mouldable like plasticine but sets as hard as rock. You can get it in terracotta, grey, black, white and yellow. None of these colours were exact colour matches for the tiles so I had to mix a few colours together to get the exact match – close up you can tell but not from standing.



After this I was finally at the normal stage of grouting, sealing and polishing just like any other tiled floor. It was a long old slog and at several stages I was cursing myself for taking the carpet up but it was well worth it in the end. I hope you find this interesting/helpful and it inspires you to restore, repair or install a period tiled floor. I look forward to reading about someone else's project in the next issue.

Pat Groves, the travelling dentist

Uganda is a poor country in East Africa. Life expectancy is 55 and 40% of the population live on less than £1 a day.

It has an estimated population of 38,000,000 and 300 dentists, many working in Kampala or other cities. 84% of Ugandans live in rural areas where there is no public transport so access to medical and dental care is difficult.

My attempt to help involves taking a portable dental chair and a bag of kit out to the villages. I have been to the same town in Western Uganda 6 times now. I work with local charities who take me

to schools, usually about 90 minutes' drive away, where often no dentist has trodden before. The method that seems to work best is to get all the children in a class who have dental pain brought to me and I work through in 4s, numbing 4, extracting the painful teeth in 4 then checking for bleeding before giving them a toothbrush and toothpaste. Then they go back to class. This way I manage around 40 extraction patients a day.

The pleasure I get from doing this is huge, relieving someone's pain must be about the best thing one can do, I am so lucky to able to help.

On noise pollution

Having lived happily in Mapperley Park for fifteen years, we are used to the background noise of city life.

Yes, we're quite accustomed to the emergency sirens which come at all hours, the monotonous bass thud from events on The Forest and even the cackles of drunks plying their way home in the early hours. And dare I say it, but things have been much quieter since The Forest was cordoned off and the boy racers had to find somewhere else to race and rev their cars.

But nothing was to prepare us for the hell which was unleashed on our ears last year, when a nearby property's burglar alarm proceeded to sound for no fewer than THREE DAYS. The flat concerned was tenanted by someone who clearly did not know how to operate the contraption or how to get her landlord to shut it up. In fact, her solution to the problem was to literally abandon ship for hours at a time and hope for the best when she returned.

Of course, this problem happened at night and over the weekend, and that our cluster of houses thus became the victim of a game of 'pat ball' between the City and the Police switchboards – each saying that we should call the other and neither showing any real concern for the frayed nerves of those of us who endured successive nights of interrupted sleep. Indeed, when the Police did eventually pin the tenant down, they showed more concern for her lack of a functioning intruder alarm than for her neighbours who had endured the pesky siren and were not far off brandishing burning pitchforks!

A kind letter from Councillor Rosemary Healy who subsequently investigated the whole fiasco for us confirms:

- Use the Police non-emergency number, 101, to report nuisance external alarms. A CPO will be tasked to investigate and liaise with the owner or occupier.
- If contact cannot be made, then the CPO will arrange for the alarm to be silenced under the provisions of the Clean Neighbourhoods and Environment Act 2005.
- For internal alarms, the CPO will refer the case to the Environmental Health and Safer Places Team who will apply to the Court to enter the property and use reasonable force to silence the alarm.

The residents of St Andrew's Road, Thorncliffe Road and Minster Court wish you a good night's sleep – but please, check when your alarm was last serviced before you turn out the light.

Trees

Since 2011 the MPRA has lobbied and worked with the City Council to replace the one metre high tree stumps that were proliferating in Mapperley Park.

The stumps are left when a tree needs to be removed due to disease. With a large street tree population, the majority being mature trees, if nothing was done, the committee was concerned that this had the potential to negatively impact the urban environment we are fortunate to enjoy in Mapperley Park.

The committee's aim was to try and work with the council to develop a sustainable plan that for every tree removed a stump would be replaced. That aim remains today. However, we have enjoyed success in getting over 30 stumps replaced and new street trees planted typically

with a variety of Maple that will not grow too large and has the added attraction of providing interest through the year with colourful leaves especially in the spring and autumn.

At the September MPRA Committee meeting two of our local councillors; Rosemary Healy and Leslie Ayoola, attended and they informed the committee that a further round of stump replacements will take place towards the end of 2016 and early 2017. All of the funding for this work is coming from the City Council and the streets where stumps will be replaced include Tavistock Drive, Zulla Road, Tavistock Avenue, Lucknow Road and Cyprus Road.

Once this round of replacement trees are planted we will have overcome the backlog. Going forward MPRA will continue to monitor and identify new stumps that will need to be replaced helping to preserve the tree lined streets of Mapperley Park.

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An update from Chris Leslie MP

The local NHS is well-respected but also increasingly well-used. Much focus in the news is on the hospitals, QMC & City Hospital, and of course on accident & emergency waiting times.

But the frontline of healthcare is of course the local GP practice. I have been contacted by a number of local residents in recent weeks regarding the closure of Mapperley Park Medical Centre.

The practice had been in special measures since June 2015 following a Care Quality Commission inspection which raised concerns in areas such as record keeping, systems and processes, and has now been closed temporarily while changes are made.

I know from emails I have received that many residents feel that Dr Stevens and his surgery offer a high level of care, and disagree with the CQC's assessment The CQC has an important job to do in ensuring patient safety, but I would hope that there would be flexibility to take account of good practice and patients' views. Anyone who would like to express

their views on the closure should write to NHS England and the CQC and ask for their concerns to be addressed.

Notes from Our Councillors...

Trees update

You may have noticed around Mapperley Park that there has been tree work taking place over the past few weeks. This is down to the Councillors putting funding in to deal with some "problem trees" in the ward.

Nottingham City Council urban forestry strategy states there must be two trees replanted for each one lost. Bearing this in mind we are now in a position to start looking for places to re-plant within the ward and we are asking for any suggestions to be sent us by Fri 18th Nov.

We are also aware of some stumps around the ward on Highways and we are working to remove these and replace with an appropriate tree in the same location. We have 12 replants to do and we would hope to get this completed this winter, if possible.

Lucknow Drive Roundabout

Preliminary designs for the Lucknow Drive traffic island have been drawn up and some tree types suggested but everything hangs on a depth scan that is being done to see how far below the surface the utilities are running. This will have a direct implication as to what can be planted on the traffic island.

Leaves

It's that time of year again when collecting fallen leaves become a priority in the area and it only takes a couple of windy days to create real problems.

To put it into perspective last year the Council collected over 700 tons of leaves across the City and on just 2 days collected 5.5 tons from Lucknow Drive alone.

There's a special garden bin collection for Mapperley Park residents on the 21st November after which they'll be no more until next year. Can we ask residents to not sweep leaves onto the pavements and roads as it can block drains and gulleys

Crime

We're pleased to report that crime in the area, indeed throughout the city, is at lower levels than we've seen for several years.

However, we are getting reports of a return of prostitution in the Mapperley Road/Mansfield Road area. It's only occasional reports of single prostitutes at the moment but we don't want to see it return to the levels we had in the past.

There is a dedicated Police Prostitution task force operating in the area and we ask residents that if you see any prostitution then please report it immediately to PC Piliero on **07595073970** or **101**.

Traffic Control

Residents report to us that the introduction of the Mapperley Road/ Chestnut Grove parking scheme is proving to be a welcome success story.

There are concerns about the knock on effect with increased car parking now being seen further along Mapperley Road towards Woodborough Road and we'll need to keep monitoring that.

It's always the case, however, that when traffic is curbed in one area it has a knock on effect elsewhere. We have had reports about speeding vehicles along Mapperley Road and we're looking into what we can do to slow traffic down.

Suspended Service for Mapperley Park Medical Centre

Care at Mapperley Park Medical Centre was suspended in September pending a review in December leaving hundreds of people in Mapperley Park without access to their GP.

The practice was put into special measures by the Care Quality Commission (NHS service watchdogs) in June last year after an inspection branded the practice 'inadequate'. A follow-up inspection found the surgery had not made sufficient improvements. Patients remain registered with the practice but should now access GP and nursing services from the Victoria and Mapperley practice at two locations in the City during the temporary closure.

Patients are frustrated by the loss of service and being kept in the dark about the reasons for the closure and when exactly the practice is due to reopen. In response to queries from residents Linda Hirst the Inspection Manager from the Derbyshire and Nottinghamshire Team has replied:

"I fully appreciate how unsettling it must be to have the practice close without full details about why this has taken place. Taking a decision to temporarily close a practice is never one we take lightly as we have to consider the impact this will have on patients...I understand you wanting to know why we have taken this action but we cannot comment at this stage and this is to protect Dr Steven's rights. Dr Stevens

has the legal right to appeal against our decision to an independent tribunal, he also has the right to see the report on our inspection and to comment on the factual accuracy of it before we publish it."

The published report can be found at: cqc.org.uk/location/1-506812065/inspection-summary#overall. Some local residents have started a campaign to reopen the practice. They are incensed not only by the lack information but that the first report was filled with seemingly petty points, conflicting statements and generally positive comments about the service.

Local resident Nick Wood has created a facebook group to support the practice and written to Mapperley Park News:

"The Care Quality Commission (CQC), says the practice is 'inadequate'. Any of the patients will tell you that nothing could be further from the truth. Even the CQC have to concede the service is consistently rated 10% above the national average for care. Why has the practice been suspended? Why are 2000+ patients without the GP they respect and trust? No-one will tell us.

If you go on to the CQC website (www. cqc.org.uk) you will see their March 2016 report. Patient approval on every aspect of his work is above average. Some of the failings are ludicrous. On one day, the angle of the computer meant, possibly, had you leaned through the receptionist's

window you could have read the screen. That would be a good trick - without standing on a chair.

We can't find out what caused the suspension or when the practice will re open. We started a Facebook page that within a few days gained 100 members – Support Mapperley Park Medical Centre – we support Dr Stevens and we want him back. If you do too, please find the page and help us get our GP back."

We can only assume that the practice will reopen as soon as Dr Steven complies with the requirements set or if the CQC interpretation of the guidelines was deemed wrong or heavy handed.
